A.Philip Randolph Institute National Conference

I had the pleasure of attending the A. Philip Randolph Institute (APRI) 52nd National Education Conference in Reno, Nevada. The opening day was for registration and a first-time attendees meeting. This was a course on the history of Asa Philip Randolph and the institute with his name. A. Philip Randolph was an American labor unionist and civil rights activist. In 1925, he organized and led the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, the first successful African-American led labor union. In 1963, Randolph was the head of the March on Washington, which was organized by Bayard Rustin, at which Reverend Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his "I Have A Dream" speech. Bayard Rustin was an African American leader in social movements for civil rights, socialism, nonviolence, and gay rights. Rustin worked with A. Philip Randolph on the March on Washington Movement, in 1941, to press for an end to racial discrimination in employment.



Information from UAW Benefits Trust website

Your Dependents

A spouse is also eligible for Trust coverage for the duration of the marriage, as long as you remain enrolled in the plan.

In order for dependent children to be eligible for Trust coverage they must meet all five eligibility requirements.

1. Relationship

Children are defined as natural or legally adopted, stepchild (child of your current spouse), a child placed with you for legal adoption who is under age 18 or a child by legal guardianship.

2. Age

Children may be eligible until the end of the calendar month in which they reach age 26. They are not subject to this restriction if they are determined to be permanently and totally disabled prior to the end of the calendar month in which they reached age 26.

A child by legal guardianship is eligible for coverage until the end of the month in which they turn age 18.

3. Marital Status

Children must not be married.

4. Residency

Children must live with you as a member of the household, or you must have legal responsibility for providing health care coverage for the child and the child must reside with the custodial parent.

5. Dependency

Children must be dependent on you, which means you can claim an exemption on your federal income tax return unless you are responsible for their medical coverage due to a divorce decree or Qualified Medical Child Support Order (QMCSO).

- All entries *must* be created by the Participants
- Exhibitors will decide which categories to place their work.
- The Retiree, Spouse, or Surviving Spouse can have up to two (2) entries but only one (1) cash prize per participant.
- All exhibitors should have theirs display set up by 10:30 am on date of show.
- There will be 4 Cash Prizes:
 - o <u>Best in Show: **\$75.00**</u>,
 - o First Runner-up: \$50.00,
 - o Second Runner-up: \$35.00,
 - o Third Runner-up: \$20.00.
- Deadline for signing up, will be before the day of the Hobby Show Union.
- Each Participant can request one (1). table used to sell the participant's own crafts.

Categories

- 1. <u>Drawing</u>: Works executed predominantly with drawing materials, including (but not limited to) pencil, charcoal, pastels, pen & ink, graphite, <u>or in combination</u>.
- Fiber/Textile Art: materials (natural or synthetic) including but not limited to fabric, yarn, thread, string, felt, rope, recycled fabrics, etc., <u>or in combination.</u> (Refer to the Artisan category for Fine Craft textiles works, i.e.: bed quilts, wearable art, etc.)
- 3. <u>Painting</u>: Works executed predominantly with painting materials, including (but not limited to) oil-based, water-based (acrylic, watercolor, tempera, gouache, spray enamel, pastel paintings etc., <u>or in combination</u>.
- 4. <u>Photography</u>: Works executed with analog or digital equipment. Printed in color or black & white. Size: 8×10 mounted on rigid board. Living things, Scenes, and Still Life.
- 5. <u>3-Dimensional</u>: Free-standing Fine Art works executed with any medium, (including but not limited to) wood, stone, metal, clay, re-purposed materials, etc., <u>or in combination</u>. Techniques may include sculpting, carving, assemblage, etc. Must be self-supporting or suitable for pedestal, shelf or table display. Max weight 75#. No works will be accepted that require the artist to be present for installation. If the piece is to be displayed directly on the floor, or if it requires a pedestal, please include the information with your entry form prior to delivery. Refer to Fiber Art Category for 3-D works in fiber/textile. Refer to the Artisan Category for 3-D Fine Crafts, furniture, pottery etc.
- 6. <u>Artisan</u>: Fine Crafts of original design, including jewelry, furniture, glass (stained, blown, fused, etc.), musical instruments, clothing/wearable art, pottery, turned wood, quilts (subject to size limit) etc. Contact the Art Chairman if you are unsure or if you have any questions.
- 7. <u>Wild Card</u>: Any original Fine Art or Fine Craft of original design that does NOT meet the criteria for the other 6 categories. 2-D or 3-D free-standing works including, but not limited to: digital art, printmaking (hand pulled original works), encaustic, assemblage, collage, mosaic, mix-media, etc.

Buy Union-Made and American-Made Products

As a union member, I know the value of solidarity and collective action. I also know the value of buying union-made and American-made products. Here are some reasons why I choose to buy products that are made in the USA by union workers, and why I avoid buying products that are imported from other countries.

- Buying union-made and American-made products supports my fellow union members and their families. When I buy products that are made in the USA by union workers, I support the livelihoods and well-being of my fellow union members and their families. I am also supporting the strength and growth of the labor movement, which fights for workers' rights, fair wages, safe working conditions, health benefits, retirement security, and social justice. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, there were about 14.3 million union members in the U.S. in 2020, representing 10.8% of the workforce. On the other hand, when I buy imported products, I hurt my fellow union members and their families. I am also weakening the labor movement, which faces threats from outsouring, offshoring, and unfair trade practices.
- Buying union-made and American-made products promotes quality and craftsmanship. When I buy products that are made in the USA by union workers, I get quality products that are made with skill and pride. I am also getting products that meet high standards of safety, durability, and performance. According to a survey by Consumer Reports, 78% of Americans would rather buy an American product than an identical one made abroad. On the other hand, when I buy imported products, I may be getting low-quality products that are made with cheap labor and materials. I may also be getting products that pose health and safety risks, break down easily, and need frequent replacement.
- Buying union-made and American-made products shows patriotism and civic responsibility. When I buy products that are made in the USA by union workers, I show my love for my country and my respect for its laws and values. I am also showing my civic responsibility by contributing to the national economy and the public good. According to a survey by Reshoring Institute, nearly 70% of Americans prefer American-made products, and more than 83% would pay up to 20% more for products made domestically. On the other hand, when I buy imported products, I may be showing my indifference or hostility to my country and its laws and values. I may also be showing my civic irresponsibility by harming the national economy and the public good.

In conclusion, buying union-made and American-made products is important to me as a union member. It is a way of expressing my solidarity, my quality standards, and my patriotism. It is also a way of making a positive difference in my own life and in the world.

Better For All By Bruce Cash II



Does it make sense to anyone, anywhere that someone working 40 hours per week in the most prospeous country in history cannot afford to pay their bills? We are the most productive workforce ever, yet some people just don't have enough. When a society as bountiful as ours can't distribute basic needs and services to all of its members, there's something wrong. That something is corporate greed.

Economics is game all players can win. When Ford gave everyone a 100% pay raise by doubling the average salary in 1914 to \$5.00 per day, businessmen thought he couldn't make a profit. They were wrong. Henry knew if employees made enough money to buy the product they built, they would, then their neighbors would want and buy one themselves. He was right and is credited with creating the modern middle class. If people have faith in future earnings, they spend, factories increase production, hire more, and make larger profits. New employees then spend, and the cycle continues.

Faith in the future is only one factor in wealth creation. Another is technological advance. Fewer hours are needed to produce more wealth now than ever because science has created better tools, yet that new prosperity is disproportionately given to corporations. Most primary research is sponsored by our taxes. Companies then monetize those advances. Shouldn't we get a return on that investment? Aren't we subsidizing their business?

Advocates argue corporations are only doing their jobs by leveraging all tools to maximize profits. They're right. What they fail to understand is we are also a democratic society, and those rules can, and should, be changed. If we want business to value the environment, social virtues, and to pay a living wage, we need to elect legislators who require them to. We should force corporations selling here to pay taxes here, use that funding to provide educational opportunities, adequate housing, appropriate nutrition, and health care for those struggling. End corporate welfare by levying federal taxes on companies equal to breaks they've gained from localities, and require bottom earners make no less than a certain percentage of what top earners make in every company. In Japan, CEO's routinely make no more than 50 times what the least paid employees in their companies make. If instituted in the Detroit Three, the lowest paid autoworker would be earning over \$400,000 per year. Critics say companies and talent would simply leave, but if they're not allowed to sell here, where would they go? Corporations realize our power is greater than theirs, therefore they employee lobbyist, fund political campaigns, advocate for Justice's who believe they deserve free speech, and find social issues to divide us on to maintain control.

Unions and government are the two main checks on their power. In 2008 when the great recession hit, we gave up C.O.L.A., agreed to let Ford hire "temporary" workers, accepted a two-tiered, in-progression pay system and gave up retirement for employees hired after 2012 (I'd like to go on record for voting NO on two-tiers and giving up retirement). Those concessions along with taking on the responsibility of retiree health care helped keep the Detroit Three in business. Over the last ten years they have made a combined profit of \$250 billion (Reuters July 21, 2023). CEO salaries in 2022 were \$21 million for Ford's Jim Farley, \$24.8 million for Stellantis' Carlos Tavares, and almost \$29 million for GM's Mary Barra (Detroit Free Press April 28, 2023). According to Google, the average hourly rate for a UAW worker is \$18.54 per hour. During those 10 years they've closed plants and started partnerships with battery and EV makers that don't recognize UAW contracts. Inflation has soared 18% since May 2019 (Reuters June 23, 2023), and in that time, we have received a 6% raise. It's time we got all of that back.

Corporation's main purpose is to increase shareholder's wealth. They will always try to limit employee compensation. The contract ends on September 14, I hope you've prepared, saved, and are well informed. If we don't strike, increase your TESPHE contributions and live on that money until its gone, then readjust. Remember, we are the Government. We are the Union. If we stick together, we can force the wealthy and corporations to pay their fair share, give us a fair deal, and make life better for all.

Never Too Young to Retire Celebrating 4 Generations with UAW/FORD

In 1913 Ford Motor Company opened what would be the first of many plants in Louisville, Kentucky, this plant was located downtown on Third Street, and started out with building Model T Cars. Joe Druien, my papaw, did not hire in quite that early but he has been retired now for 42 years. He is currently the retiree with the greatest number of years retired.

Joe hired into Ford Motor Company on April 2, 1952, at the age of 21, at the time he hired in the plant had relocated to Southwestern Parkway on the Ohio River, known as the Parkway by those that remember it. He recalls applying for a job at Ford to better support his family, at the time he hired in he was married and had one son, my father, Ray Druien.

Ford relocated again in 1955 to Fern Valley Road, and Papaw moved right along with them, here they produced a multitude of vehicle names including the Ford Sunliner, Fairlane, Galaxie, Various Edsel Branded Vehicles along with heavy trucks. In 1969 Ford Motor Company built the Kentucky Truck Plant and moved the Heavy truck line to this location. Papaw stayed at Louisville Assembly where they retooled for the Ford Ranger and Bronco II. The Druien family continued to prosper and grow while Papaw was employed at Ford

Motor Company adding 3 more beautiful daughters, my aunts. With the help of the UAW, Papaw got my father and his

oldest daughter a job at the plant, adding 2 generations of Druien's to the UAW/FORD family. Tragically my father lost his life to gun violence in 1976, however my aunt, using UAW negotiated benefits, went on to college, getting a medical degree and working with some of the best pediatric heart surgeons in KY. Fast forward to 1993 I, Melissa Druien-Bennett, was lucky enough to get a job at KTP making me a third generation UAW/FORD employee. Later, my brother, Ronnie Druien, would get hired at KTP and most recently my nephew, Aaron Kapp was hired making him a fourth generation UAW/FORD employee. Papaw did various operations during his 31 years at Ford Motor Company. From working the assembly line, bidding into transportation where he loaded finished vehicles in rail cars, to his final job when he retired, working out of the air tool repair crib.

Papaw is proud to say he is a DUES PAYING MEMBER of the UAW. When he retired at the age of 51, he still had 2 daughters at home, one in high school and one in grade school. Because of his UAW benefits and his business suave intuitions he was able to retire at a young age. To stay busy after retirement he continued to build houses as well



to retire at a young age. To stay busy after retirement he continued to build houses as well as buying and running apartment housing complexes, buying, and selling used vehicles and taking care of his weekend house in the country. This all kept him busy and according to him young (Papaw has aged well, no photo filters needed for him). Now at the age of 92 Papaw is slowing down but not by much. He has settled down in the country where he still maintains

a beautiful home and yard. He enjoys spending time with his family. His daughters are all doing well, giving him lots of grandchildren and some great grandchildren. His sons' children and grandchildren are continuing the UAW/ Ford family tradition.

Epilogue - During our FORD talks we often discuss the changes that have taken place over the years, with tooling and automation. How the line speeds have greatly increased. Where Ford was producing 300 vehicles a day in the 1960's, presently KTP can produce 100 Vehicles an hour between both Chassis lines. The biggest thing Papaw can't seem to get over is the fact that we do not use timecards or have cafeterias to eat in. He recalls some of his greatest friendships were forged while standing in line to punch his timecard or playing cards in the cafeteria. Papaw did not have many pictures, although one picture in particular was of his boss, Steve Holloway, giving him his 30-year pin (seen in article). This made Papaw wonder what happened to Steve as they were friends in and out of the Plant. My Aunt and her Husband (Kim and Vince Kruer) used


social media to locate Steve. He was living in Florida and just happened to be in Louisville that week, so Papaw was able to reconnect with him. What are the chances that this article could bring about so much reconnection and happiness. Thanks to my cousin, LAP retiree, Gordy Druien for tasking me with this project. It was a pleasure to see the joy in my Papaws face. Thanks to the UAW for providing such a wonderful life for 4 generations of the Druien family.



Union hall on Fern Valley Rd.










